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# IMPACT REPORT 2021-2022

### **HIGHLIGHTS 2021-2022**

#### Community Collaborations to Protect Land, Water and Wildlife

East Windham Conservation Project is a partnership project between the Land Trust and the Town of Windham – larger than the size of Bradbury State Park. This regionally significant project will provide 10 miles of new multi-use trails with water access, scenic overlooks, and sweeping views of the White Mountains.



#### **Expanding Access to Nature Close to Home**

Through Steep Falls Village Preserve in Standish and Lowell Preserve in Windham, we have added six miles to our trail system, bringing the total to 30 miles of trail, which are free for the public and open year round.

### Connecting with the Outdoors


We provided free outdoor educational programming to over 500 youth, families, and community members. Programs included: Learn to Paddle, Birding 101, Mushroom Identification, and Learn to Snowshoe. For families, we added a seasonally changing story walk at Hawkes Preserve in Gorham.

### What We Protect for the Community

#### Land


• Forever conserve 2,170 acres of meadow, farm, and forest lands

#### Water

- Protect 21 miles of river, stream, and lake frontage
- Monitor water quality at 45 sites throughout the Presumpscot River watershed

#### Wildlife

- Protect 7 miles of wild brook trout habitat
- Steward the migration of thousands of alewife fish through Mill Brook Preserve
- Protect 50 acres of meadows for pollinators and ground-nesting birds



### What We Provide for the Community

#### **Public Access**

- Maintain 30 miles of forested walking trails across 18 different preserves
- Coordinate the Sebago to the Sea Train
- Provide 4 water access launch points for paddling
- Provide access to 11 miles of rivers and streams for fishing
